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I. Departmental Overview

- Over the past five years, the Art Department has had 56 students graduate with Bachelor's Degrees in Art.
- The Art Department continues to sponsor art exhibitions and workshops to contribute to the cultural enrichment of the community and our students. Students are encouraged to visit museums in the Oklahoma City and North Texas area as individuals and as part of department-sponsored museum visits.
- In 2017, there was one faculty retirement, with that position being filled. There was one additional non-tenure track faculty hired in 2021. With the addition of one TFT faculty member, the department is better able to manage the gallery and facility, in addition to offering a robust schedule of courses each semester.

- Provide a brief overview of strengths and weaknesses of the department/program that will be discussed in more detail in the self-study report.
 - One strength of our department is that we are generally unified as a faculty in keeping the student's best interest in mind when it comes to teaching and changes to the department. Another strength is that we have a professionally qualified full-time and adjunct faculty. A weakness in the department is that we rely too heavily on adjunct faculty to help teach all the classes that are required in our program. More full-time faculty would reduce the load of "non-teaching" duties on the full-time faculty and could be shared more equitably with more faculty.
 - The Visual Arts Division offers one of the few professional Graphic Design degree programs in the Texoma region. It is unique in that it not only provides students with state-of-the-art technical training but also gives them the opportunity to receive a Baccalaureate degree. The demand for students trained in Graphic Design with skills in branding, publication design, web design, logo development and production graphics is growing as regional demographics change and as population increases. The Bachelor of Arts (Graphic Design Emphasis) gives the University a unique opportunity to serve the new regional economy in a direct and very visible way.
 - The B.A. (Art Studio emphasis) program is increasingly being used as a baccalaureate degree completion by students who begin their artistic studies at

regional community colleges and other institutions. Many Art Studio majors then go on to pursue a graduate degree.

- The B.A. (Art Education emphasis) is integral to the University's School of Education by providing competent graduates as certified teachers of art. While demand for art teachers in the regional area is limited because not every school requires a specialist art teacher, the program provides a needed source of competent art teachers prepared to teach from a comprehensive art discipline base. As art teachers retire or leave, our art education graduates have found teaching positions in numerous surrounding counties in Southeastern Oklahoma and North Texas and are building respect for the discipline of art in public education.
- The Visual Art Division is uniquely placed on the front line of community engagement. Centre Art Gallery exhibitions, scholastic competitions, and scholarly presentations facilitate much needed cultural enrichment in the community. They also bring community resources and positive visibility to the University. The Visual Art Division has had the opportunity to partner financially with local, state, and tribal institutions in its commitment to provide opportunities for life-long learning and aesthetic experiences. The relationship between local arts groups, cultural institutions and the Visual Arts Division is a unique and profitable example of public and private community engagement.
- The Visual Art programs at Southeastern are also unique among Oklahoma institutions in that Southeastern's geographic location affords easy access to the considerable cultural and artistic resources of the Fort Worth and Dallas metropolitan areas.

- II. Implementation of Recommendation from Previous Program Review
 - Recommendations from 2013 report
 - Add a zero-level class to encourage students to attend exhibitions and other events. DONE
 - ART 1200 was added to the degree plan
 - Adding 6-9 hours of art history to the Graphic Design degree plan. **DONE**
 - All art majors are now required to take two art history surveys in addition to History and Theory of Design, to add up to 9 hours.
 - Having qualified faculty in each area of instruction. **DONE**
 - All faculty, including adjuncts, have terminal degrees in their respective fields
 - Reducing the number of overloads taught by full-time faculty. Partially Done
 - Reviewer failed to acknowledge that Painting 1, 2, 3, 4; Ceramics 1-4, and Applied Design 1-2 are offered concurrently. This is done to ensure that there is sufficient combined student enrolment.
 - The need to have a total of four full-time faculty in the art department. **Partially Done.**
 - We have gone from two full-time faculty to two full-time faculty and one non-tenure track, temporary full-time faculty
 - Recommended that we hire a full-time administrative assistant and a dedicated facilities person. **Partially Done**
 - We now have a ½ time secretary and a 1/5-time facilities person.
 - $\circ~$ The need to have a formal assessment of student progress over the span of the program. NOT DONE

- Recruiting efforts have been minimal at best. With only two full-time faculty for four of
 the past five years, the focus has had to be on teaching and advising. We have had
 students come to campus for Super Saturday prior to the pandemic. We also have had
 students come to campus for the curriculum contest. This was disrupted due to the
 pandemic, but it will resume this spring. Amy Gantt consistently presents a program
 about careers in the arts for the 8th grade career discovery day each January. Finally,
 Jack Ousey who is the on the Advisory Council for Kiamichi Technology Center and
 Southern Tech Graphic Design programs, is developing collaborative relationships with
 both programs which should develop as a recruitment tool with both institutions.
- What actions has your department taken, if any, to increase retention and graduation of students in the last five years?
 - We play an active role in advising our majors as soon as they declare Visual Arts as their major.
 - We bring potential students to campus for events such as Super Saturday and Curriculum Contest.
 - We have scholarships available for art majors.
- Visual Art students are encouraged to join the Visual Arts and Ceramics Organization (VACO). This student run group participates in fund-raising activities that benefit the art group and the VA department in general.
- Our zero credit ART 1200: Art Experiences class motivates students to become involved and attend various Art Exhibitions and workshops on and off campus. This course also encourages students to enter juried art shows and to professionally display their artwork and graphic designs.
- There are several internship opportunities throughout the campus and within local business community where students can hone their design skills in a supervised work environment. Students are assigned and expected to create various design projects for print and for the web. This real-world experience helps the students to gain valuable experience, gain confidence in their design skills and builds up their design portfolios.
- Following graduation, our students do not have trouble finding jobs in the workforce. There are 16 recent graduates working in graphic design positions. We have five of our Art Education graduates teaching in local schools and at least two of our recent graduates are working on graduate degrees. These are the former students that we have been able to keep tabs on.

IV. Faculty

A. Disciplinary Breadth of Faculty

- Jack Ousey has an MFA in sculpture. He has also earned numerous certificates in graphic design courses. Ousey has a strong exhibition record over the past 20 years. Ousey was also an Artist-in-Residence for the Oklahoma Art Council prior to working in Higher Education.
- \circ Matthew Freeman has an MFA in painting. He also has a strong exhibition record.
- Amy Gantt has an MFA in ceramics. She worked as a middle school art teacher prior to working in Higher Education. She has a strong exhibition and presentation record.

Gaps or Strategic Hires

- Hiring faculty with an MFA in painting puts us in an advantageous position for the future, as our current painting and color theory teacher may be retiring soon. We should have a seamless transition when she chooses to do so.
- This new TFT position needs to be transitioned to a tenure-track position as soon as possible.
- If we want to grow our Art Education program, we should hire an additional faculty to enable us to focus on recruiting and building our program.

B. Teaching/Advising

Over the past five years, instructional loads have remained consistent. We did add two
adjunct instructors (J. Matthew Freeman and Shelley Tate-Garner) so that we could expand
our course offerings. Now that Freeman is part of the full-time faculty, we are running the
department with three full-time and three adjunct faculty. Each semester, Professor Ousey

teaches overload courses. Dr. Adams and Dr. Beach usually offer three classes each, while Professor Tate-Garner offers 1-2 classes per semester. Professors Freeman and Gantt generally teach 4 classes each per semester.

 Depending on the nature of the course, assessment can happen in different ways. Some instructors in the department offer a pre- and post-test, while others have students build a portfolio over the course of the semester to see the progress made. Looking at the data for each individual class offers professors the chance to see areas in which they can improve in their teaching.

IV. Recommendations

Overall Ratings for Programs:

Art Education: Adequate

Rationale: We continue to have only a handful of students in the program. Over the past five years, we have had only one graduate. Two other students were in the program, but were unable to pass the OSAT, which meant that they were not able to complete their student teaching. They ended up getting their degrees in studio art and had to take the path of alternative certification.

Art Studio: Outstanding

Rationale: Through a rigorous set of core and studio classes, our graduates are well prepared to enter graduate school.

Graphic Design: Outstanding

Rationale: Our graduates receive a rigorous set of classes and are well-prepared to enter the workforce upon graduation. Our graduates are regularly hired upon graduation.

Specific Departmental Recommendations:

- 1. To decrease reliance on adjuncts, we need to hire one more full-time faculty
- 2. We need a full-time facilities person (both #1 and #2 were recommended in 2013 but are still not completed.)

- 3. Addition of a mid-level assessment in the form of a sophomore/junior show to be critiqued by all current faculty members.
- 4. The possibility of expanding the graphic design program to include a motion graphics course that would include video and computer animation.
- 5. Transition the TFT position to a tenure-tack position
- 6. With the addition of a 4th faculty member, we could build the art studio program to include a focus in 2D or 3D art. We could also build the art education program.
- 7. A 4th faculty member would also allow us to investigate changing our degree program from a BA to BFA. This could possibly give us the chance to add more visual art-specific courses to our degree plans since the students would not have to complete so many liberal arts hours.

In 2013 reorganized and submitted entire program requirement changes from three separate programs (Bachelor of Science. Art Education, Bachelor of Science, Graphic Design & Visual Media, Bachelor of Art, Art Studio) to one program, Bachelor of Art with three options: Graphic Design, Art Teaching Certification, Art Studio. Approved by the Oklahoma Board of Regents. The new Bachelor of Art with Three Options improved reception of the degree to graduate programs of larger institutions and resulted in all majors being combined in one program number by the Board of Regents, state of Oklahoma.

Teaching Innovations

I began teaching online from the initial development of online classes at Southeastern, approximately 2000. I presently teach three classes as total online courses in Blackboard©: ART 3083 Issues in Aesthetics and Criticism, ART 3103 Survey of Native North America, and ART 1003 Art & Visual Communication. I also incorporate utilize Blackboard online capabilities within my normal classroom teaching such as: grade book, class notes, handouts, extension information, websites, etc. and utilize Smart Classroom with PowerPoint presentations with audio lectures in all my online classes.

DEPARTMENT OF ART + DESIGN: MEDIA + COMMUNICATION

East Central University's Department of Art + Design : Media + Communication encourages collaboration across disciplines and offers major and minor programs in art, communication, and media.

In art, students develop a personal, aesthetically based, problemsolving approach to the visual arts and acquire skills in drawing, painting, design, sculpture, ceramics, and digital media. Lecture courses are designed to engage students in the contextuality of art as a historical dialogue.

Facilities include state of the art studios for drawing, painting, printmaking, ceramics, sculpture, digital imaging and foundations. The Department can access over 50,000 images via database for art history. It houses a state of the art digital imaging laboratory. Other equipment in the department includes: high fire, raku, and salt glazing kilns for ceramics; metal working equipment, a ceramic shell foundry, CNC machine, 3D printer, wood and stone carving equipment for sculpting; and equipment for etching, lithography, serigraphy, and relief printmaking, audio and video production.

ART PROGRAM

The department offers a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree with concentrations in studio art, art education, and graphic design. The concentration in studio art prepares students for positions as an artist or for further study in fine arts graduate programs. The concentration in art education prepares students for positions teaching art in school prekindergarten through grade twelve. The graphic design concentration prepares students for positions in which graphic design skills are paramount, which include design, typography layout and graphic design for publication, and corporate image design.

MASS COMMUNICATION PROGRAMS

The department also offers a Mass Communication major with concentrations in Media Production, Advertising/Public Relations, and Strategic Communication. Media Production prepares students to enter graduate programs, media industries, government and business. It also serves students who wish to pursue careers and other interests in audio and video production, and electronic and print journalism. Advertising/Public Relations prepares students who wish to pursue careers representing businesses and other organizations through the use of mass media.

Strategic Communication prepares students for careers in content creation, broadcasting/streaming, and public relations with listening and presentational skills, communications theory, and practical industry experiences.

Minors are offered in Art, Communication, Art Therapy, Media/ Graphic Arts and Mass Communication. Certification in Mass Communication (Accounts Management) is offered.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH AND LANGUAGES

The Department of English and Languages offers a major in English. It offers minors in English, Spanish, Humanities, and English as a Second Language, as well as course work in additional languages. Students in the department's major and minor programs enhance their reading and writing skills important in a variety of careers, absorb the cultural understanding necessary for success in a diverse society, and develop the critical thinking skills which will lead to professional and advanced academic success.

The major in English is appropriate for many professional and cultural objectives. By properly selecting courses, students may prepare for a variety of options:

graduate work in literature, writing, or linguistics; certification for secondary teaching; professional work in creative, expository, and technical writing; or professional study in such areas as law or technical communication.

Because of the comprehensive variety of courses offered, students have opportunity within the major to explore areas of special interest: for example, American, British and world literatures, the English language, or technical and creative writing.

ENGLISH PROGRAM

The Department of English and Languages offers undergraduate majors in English and English Teacher Certification. English majors develop broad cultural awareness and advanced reading and writing skills through study of poetry, drama, fiction, film, and critical theory.

Additional study of creative and persuasive writing, and grammar and linguistics prepares students for graduate study in literature, rhetoric and composition, creative or technical writing, linguistics, or for study of law. English Teacher Certification majors take additional courses in methods of teaching English to attain state certification qualifying them to teach English at the middle and high school levels. The department also offers minors in English, English as a Second Language, and Humanities.

LANGUAGES

The department offers a minor in Spanish. Courses in the Spanish minor may include work in literature, grammar, composition, conversation, and culture. In addition, the department offers basic courses in French, and Russian. All foreign language studies provide awareness of the culture of the language and insight into the unique world view of different languages.

HUMANITIES

The department offers a minor in the humanities, those branches of learning which deal with what is fundamentally human—selfconsciousness, language, reason, creativity, human values and aspirations. The department and the college offer a wide range of humanities courses to serve the minor and satisfy university general education requirements. Examples include courses in literature, film, language, history, philosophy, religion, art, music, and theater.

DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY

Professor and Chair Bean Professors Barton, Clampitt, Mount Associate Professor Sutton

Success in any career today demands flexibility based in three skill areas: the ability to think critically, the ability to analyze information from a variety of sources and apply that analysis to solving problems, and the ability to communicate that analysis to others. These skills are particularly critical for careers in law, government, business, teaching, medicine, as well as for success in graduate or professional school.

Founded solidly in the tradition of liberal arts, the Department of History at East Central University emphasizes developing these skills. Each History and Native American Studies major may, with the help of faculty, tailor a program to best match individual career and intellectual interests. The department offers degrees in History, and History (Teacher Certification). In addition, the department offers courses in Native American Studies.

HISTORY PROGRAM

History offers students the richness of past experience to comprehend more lucidly humanity's progress and setbacks, great accomplishments and tragic failures. Historical study teaches judgment, examines values, and explores issues and events; it uncovers the sources of creativity and stagnation during the entire course of civilization's evolution. The significance of the past and its meaning for the possibilities of the present and future become a powerful tool of analysis and interpretation. The History program offers a widerange of courses in United States history, European history, and World history. A student may major or minor in history, selecting an area of concentration for either a BA or a BA with teacher certification.

History as a major combined with other disciplines, provides excellent preparation for a productive and meaningful personal and professional life. Majors utilize their skills to teach history and related courses in elementary and secondary school. Graduates may also pursue advanced degrees in history in order to teach and conduct research at the college level. History majors also continue their education in other graduate and professional programs such as journalism, law, management, and public administration. Graduates also seek careers in business, public service, and informational and research positions.

INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES PROGRAM

NATIVE AMERICAN STUDIES PROGRAM

Assistant Professor and Director Ketchum

ECU offers both a BA and a minor in Native American Studies. Native American Studies is an interdisciplinary program that reflects an awareness of the issues which contemporary native communities and peoples confront. By approaching the multiplicity of Indian cultures from a variety of academic perspectives, a deeper understanding of native societies past and present emerges. It makes use of the strengths of university faculty members in history, archaeology, political science, business, nursing, legal studies, art, English, professional programs in human services, and other disciplines.

We also offer a BA in Native American Studies - Cultural Resource Management (CRM). CRM students learn to manage cultural resources that include heritage and the arts. Archaeology and the study of material culture is central to their work. In addition to understanding Native American history and culture, students pursuing this major will learn about tribal, federal, state, and local regulations and guidelines that impact how we manage cultural resources.

DEPARTMENT OF PERFORMING ARTS

Assistant Professor and Chair Vickers Professor Baggech Adolf Linscheid Distinguished Teaching Professor Walker Associate Professor Berman Assistant Professors Conklin, Meyers Instructors Pletcher, Reifsnider

The Department of Performing Arts provides a general music and theatre education foundation for all students along with individual professional preparation for selected major fields within music and theatre. The department also enriches the cultural life of the campus and community. Students are encouraged to participate in band, choral and instrumental ensembles and theatre productions regardless of their major.

MUSIC PROGRAM

The Department of Music offers the following degree programs: the Bachelor of Science degree with music majors in the Instrumental Concentration, the Instrumental Teacher Certification Concentration, the Vocal Concentration, and the Vocal Teacher Certification Concentration. Each area has options designed as preparation for careers in concert, theater, media performance, or as teacher-preparation leading to kindergarten through high school certification. Students who wish to prepare for a career in music business may complete the minor in Business Administration for Music Majors. Other minors and special endorsements in music are also available.

The curriculum has been designed to assist all participating students in reaching their maximum potential. Toward this end, the primary objectives of the undergraduate programs are (1) to further the performance ability in at least one musical medium, (2) to provide future teachers with the knowledge and skills necessary for them to be successful as professional music educators, (3) to allow some "semi-specialization" through courses directed toward instrumental and/or vocal education, and (4) to provide students with a wide range of educational/musical experiences which will encourage continued professional growth.

THEATRE PROGRAM

The Department of Performing Arts also offers a BA with concentrations in theatre and musical theatre.

Applied Music—Individual and Class Instruction Voice, Piano, Harpsichord, Organ, Wind, String and Percussion Instruments

Private and class lessons: one semester hour credit for one halfhour private lesson, or two or more half-hour class lessons, with five hours of practice expected per week, for a semester or equivalent time in a shorter term. Extra fees are charged for instruction and for practice rooms (see fee schedule).

The course numbers are progressive by semester in each of the Applied Music areas, and include one or two credit hours.

Private instruction course numbers for music majors and minors are as follows: 2201 - minor instrument (lower level), 2222 major instrument (lower level), 3301 minor instrument (upper level), 3332 - major instrument (upper level). Numbers above 4082 indicate study completed beyond eight terms.

The course description for all private instruction is "The study of solo vocal and instrumental literature of different historical periods and styles, and of diction in English, French, German, and Italian."

DEPARTMENT OF POLITICS, LAW, AND SOCIETY

Professor and Chair Pappas Professor Petrowsky Professor and Director of the Legal Studies Program Owens Associate Professor Peaden Assistant Professors Ananga, Becerra, Jones, Webster

The Political Science and Legal Studies programs offer degrees with very different objectives: the BA in political science and the BS in legal studies. Political science majors are given more of an emphasis on critical thinking and written and oral communication skills. Classes are typically discussion-based and service learning and simulations are often employed. The legal studies program is much more applied, teaching skills that will be applicable in the law office, such as legal business applications and knowledge of specialty law subjects. Most classes are based on lectures and focused projects. Both programs study the connection between law and politics and both programs are popular avenues to law school. Paralegals may not provide legal services directly to the public, except as permitted by law.

The Department of Politics, Law and Society also offers a wide variety of courses and a minor in sociology. *Sociology* is the scientific study of the social causes and consequences of human behavior. The subject matter of sociology has a broad range. It includes the study of the intimate family, as well as the hostile mob. Crime and its causes are studied, as well as religion and its influences. Divisions of race and social class are included, as well as the sharing of beliefs in a common culture. In addition, the department offers courses in cultural anthropology, archaeology, and Native American Studies.

DEPARTMENT OF PROFESSIONAL PROGRAMS IN HUMAN SERVICES

Associate Professor, Interim Assistant Dean, and Chair Inglis Assistant Professors Fredman, Parr, Schafer-Morgan, Turner, Ward Instructors Bailey, Burke, Isaacs, Switzer, Taylor, Witherington

The Department of Professional Programs in Human Services offers educational programs that share the common goal of preparing graduates to work with people in a variety of practice settings. The human services field is one of the most rapidly expanding career fields in America today. The Professional Programs in Human Services Department focuses on those careers which require professional preparation for service to individuals, families, groups, and communities. Degree programs include Human Services, Counseling, Criminal Justice, Social Work or Prevention Science. In addition to a general degree program, the Counseling major may select a concentration in rehabilitation, aging services, or services to the deaf. Within the Counseling concentration, students may select a set of courses that prepare them for additions counseling. The Criminal Justice student may choose criminal justice or law enforcement. The Social Work program, through its Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program, offers students opportunities for guaranteed employment in child welfare. The student may create a degree plan which will prepare them for entry-level employment in a variety of settings.

The objectives for the Department of Professional Programs in Human Services are:

- 1. To prepare students educationally for positions in counseling, criminal justice, or social work.
- 2. To help supply both the regional and local employee pool for human service agencies and organizations.
- 3. To provide students with a sound undergraduate base for graduate study.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROGRAM

The primary objective of the Criminal Justice degree is to prepare students for beginning professional jobs in the criminal justice system. The curriculum provides a core program of basic courses applicable to all criminal justice fields and specialties. Students gain practical experience through completion of an internship or for those seeking CLEET certification, the Collegiate Officer Program.

HUMAN SERVICES COUNSELING PROGRAM

The primary objective of the Human Services Counseling degree is to prepare students for beginning human services positions in a variety of government, civic, and private and not-for-profit community based agencies and organizations. These agencies focus on the needs of people experiencing a variety of issues, physical or mental problems, drug or alcohol abuse, aging related concerns, and job-seeking problems. Client groups to be served range from youth and minorities to those in crisis situations. To prepare students for a variety of employment opportunities, the Human Services Counseling curriculum provides the knowledge and skills needed for prevention and problem solving with both individuals and groups.

Concentration in Rehabilitation

The Rehabilitation concentration is designed to prepare students for positions in a variety of federal, state, and community rehabilitation agencies, facilities, and organizations that provide services to individuals with disabilities and addictions. Students completing the program have skills in interviewing, case management, planning, intervention, job/career development, and knowledge of the major disability groups, addictions, and disability culture.

Students may opt for the concentration in rehabilitation or may seek additional expertise in the field of addictions with the minor in Addictions. The rehabilitation program is a Registered Program on the Council on Rehabilitation Education's Undergraduate Program in Disability and Rehabilitation Studies. The program also has various scholarships specific to the rehabilitation program for students. These include assistance through Rehabilitation Services Administration, the Virgil Taylor Scholarship and the Lowell E. Green Scholarship.

Concentration in Aging Services

The Aging Specialization is designed to prepare students for positions in community organizations serving older adults. Courses cover the social and psychological aspects of aging, program planning and evaluation, and intervention techniques; and they provide the other technical skills needed to work with older individuals. Students are acquainted with nutrition programs; senior centers; area agencies on aging; and other federal, state, and private gerontological resources.

Concentration in Services to the Deaf

The objective of the Services to the Deaf concentration is to prepare students to work with deaf and hard of hearing individuals. The academic program is structured to provide students with the specialized knowledge and sign language skills that will enable them to provide services in a broad spectrum of private, state, federal, and community agencies. A minor in Interpreting is available.

Concentration in Prevention Science

The primary objective of the Human Services Counseling Prevention Science concentration is to prepare students to address the prevention of social and public health concerns and related programming and research. Specifically, the concentration focuses on mental health and substance prevention, as well as standards for implementing and evaluating prevention strategies and efforts.

SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM

The primary objective of the Social Work education program is to prepare competent and effective generalist social work professionals for entry into direct professional practice positions with individuals, families, groups, communities, and organizations. Students graduating with a degree in social work (BSW) are prepared for employment in many public and private agencies: health care, including hospitals, home health, and hospice; child welfare; mental health; and income maintenance programs. The Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program provides incentives for social work students pursuing a career in Child Welfare. This program also provides students with an educational foundation for graduate education in social work.

The Social Work Program is nationally accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). The curriculum prepares its graduates for generalist practice through mastery of nine core competencies as identified in the *Educational Policy and Accreditation Standards (2008)* by the CSWE. These core competencies are: demonstrate ethical and professional behavior, engage diversity and difference in practice, advance human rights and social, economic and environmental justice, engage in practice-informed research and research-informed practice, engage in policy practice, engage with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities, intervene with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities, and evaluate practice with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities.

Minors and Electives

In addition to the degree programs, minors are offered in Addictions, Aging Services, Criminal Justice, Human Services Counseling, Interpreting, Juvenile Justice, Services to the Deaf, and Social Work. Through the informed selection of a minor and elective courses, students may gain more in-depth knowledge in selected areas of interest. Students are encouraged to consult with their faculty advisor in the choice of a minor and elective courses.

Requirements for Admission to Professional Program in Human Services

Students selecting a major in Professional Programs in Human Services (Human Services, Counseling, Social Work, Criminal Justice) must file an application with their faculty advisors. The application is submitted after the student has successfully completed the appropriate introductory course. (SOWK 2273 - Introduction to Social Work and Social Welfare or HURES 2183 - Fundamentals of Counseling; or HURES 2293 - Introduction to Aging; or HURES 2153 - Introduction to Deafness; HURES 2213 - Introduction to Rehabilitation; or CRJS 2233 - Introduction to Criminal Justice).

The criteria for admission are:

- 1. Completion of a minimum of 30 semester hours with a minimum overall grade point average of 2.25 on all course work attempted.
- 2. Attainment of a "C" or better in Freshman Composition I and II or fulfillment of this requirement by one of the following:
 - Earning a score of 3, 4, or 5 on the Advanced Placement Program of the College Board. A score of 4 or 5 fulfills the ECU requirement for both Freshman Composition I and II;
 - Scoring a 50 or higher on the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) with essay option will fulfill the ECU requirement for Freshman Composition I; there is no CLEP to test out of Freshman Composition II.
- 3. Attainment of a "C" or better in the introductory course for the major.
- 4. Receive a favorable recommendation by the faculty advisor and/or program faculty members. After full consideration, the applicant is (a) unconditionally admitted, (b) conditionally admitted, (c) not admitted, or (d) deferred, pending additional information.
- 5. Conditional admission may be granted to a student below minimum requirements for admission if, based on findings by the advisor and/or program faculty, the student may reasonably be expected to meet admission standards within a specified length of time, no later than one semester prior to internship.

A student denied admission has the right to appeal the decision. The procedure for appeal is found in the *ECU Student Handbook* or may be obtained from the Department Chair.

*Note: Social work majors not formally admitted to the Program are not permitted to be enrolled in social work courses beyond the introductory and field work courses.

The Art Education program prepares the student for an art career in public education, while the Art program prepares the art student for a career in the studio art or design professions. Both areas cover theory as well as practice.

Art majors may seek a B.F.A. with an emphasis in one of three areas: 2-D studio art (drawing, painting, printmaking), 3-D studio art (ceramics and pottery, sculpture, applied design), or Graphic Design, which offers comprehensive training in the use of designrelated software, preparing students for careers in the graphicdesign industry. Students majoring in Art Education will be trained in methods and materials, and will also have opportunities for classroom observation and internship.

Communication Arts offers numerous opportunities for students to practice their skills as speakers, actors, directors, designers, editors, writers, broadcasters and reporters. Student publications range from a weekly student newspaper to an alumni magazine. The department majors also produce a weekly television news program.

A full season of theatre is presented yearly with classics, children's theatre, musicals and modern pieces presented regularly. Student organizations and activities supported by the department include Hilltop Players, Southwestern Communication Association, the University Media Association, the Bulldog Broadcasting Network and Midnight Theatre.

You overcame the struggles of the pandemic and were able to help students matriculate in an on online environment. Great work in collecting and analyzing this data. The program mission clearly aligns with the mission of the university. The program has multiple clearly stated goals which are aligned with multiple learning outcomes. The pre and post-tests provide an objective measure of learning throughout the courses. While you the pre and post-tests provide objective measures at the beginning and the portfolios and presentations provide subjective measures at the end of the program, there is no measure of progress throughout the program. As stated, with the addition of new faculty, it would be good to provide additional measures to benchmark student progress throughout the program.

EXTERNAL REVIEW OF SOUTHEASTERN OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY'S ART PROGRAMS

Summary:

The art programs at Southeastern State University have sponsored several art exhibitions and workshops contributing to the cultural enrichment of students, faculty, staff and the community. The self-report indicates strengths and weakness of the departments. As an external reviewer, I intend to offer an objective viewpoint for improvements and provide some suggestions for long term and short-term goals.

Goals and objectives of the Art Program

The art programs must serve and navigate under the umbrella of the university's mission statement. "Southeastern Oklahoma State University provides an environment of academic excellence that enables students to reach their highest potential. By having personal access to excellent teaching, challenging academic programs, and extracurricular experiences, students will develop skills and habits that promote values for career preparation, responsible citizenship, and lifelong learning". Based off this current mission statement, this report will address academic excellence through personal excellent teaching, challenging academic programs including an analysis of degree requirements and extracurricular activities that develop career skills and citizenship.

Faculty

Jack Ousey, Associate Professor, has an M.F.A. in sculpture/ceramics and has been a full professor since 2017. His innovation for major curricular changes and new courses and programs is instrumental to the growth of the department. Shelley Garner has an MFA in Graphic Design and an impressive background of exhibitions. J. Freeman has an M.F.A in painting and holds a TFT instructor position. This position should be converted to a full-time tenure track assistant professor position. Anita Beach, PhD., in Art Education is a necessary contribution for the art education degree. Her experience as Chair and implementations of degree requirements has been productive for the department.

Doann Adams, Ed.E., is a bridge between painting and ceramics and education. The faculty is well prepared to teach courses in their discipline areas. There is some overlap of expertise in your faculty members backgrounds.

<u>RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FACULTY</u>: The faculty is well suited, however, it appears as though the department needs an art historian. A long-term goal would be to consider hiring an art historian either full time or adjunct. Another long-term goal is to convert the full time temporary instructor position to be replaced by a tenure track assistant professor position. The current faculty in this position has the credentials for the promotion to tenure track and assistant professor.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR FACULTY LOAD:

Adams has the credentials to welcomed into full time faculty ranks. If the department hired an Art Historian this position could also teach a studio course and relief workload from other faculty.

Curriculum:

Graphic Design:

The major and minor requirements are appropriate and similar to other institutions. The core of 27 hours reflects an amalgamation of foundational drawing and design courses, history and theory.

RECOMMENDATIONS ON DEGREE REQUIREMENTS FOR GRAPHIC DESIGN:

The graphic design requirements are appropriate and the department may want to consider an advanced applied design option. There are 9 elective hours with a vast array of courses to choose from. A short-term goal would be to encourage better utilization of the elective hours. Southeastern could reduce the elective hours to 6 and add 3 credits of an introduction to graphic design course to the required list of courses. The program should include an introduction to

graphic design course in the requirements. Other considerations might include moving the Typographic Design course to the required list of coursework. An additional elective could be Package Design.

Art Studio:

The requirement of 44 general education hours appears higher than average. The 27 core hours mimic graphic design. The required hours offer diverse studio options and elective hours offer secondary courses of interest. These options are comparable to other institutional options.

<u>RECOMMENDATIONS ON DEGREE REQUIREMENTS</u>:

It would improve the program to also add an introduction to graphic design course.

Art Teacher:

The required hours focus on ceramic, drawing, painting, printmaking and history fulfilling a nice diverse set of requirements. The electives include courses such as Foundations of Education and Child and Adolescent Development for Education Majors.

RECOMMENDATIONS ON DEGREE REQUIREMENTS:

A foundation short-term goal would be to move Foundations of Education and Child and Adolescent Development for Education Major to the required list of courses.

ART PROGRAM OUTCOMES:

Student learning outcomes and goals targets are met or exceeded.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROGRAM OUTCOMES:

Congratulations on meeting and exceeding the expected target pass rates. However, there is a still a significant gap in student assessment. A mid-level assessment, one between core hours and senior seminar is necessary to gauge student progress toward graduation. Now that additional

faculty have been added to the department it is time to reconsider adding a middle level student assessment. A long-term goal would be to evaluate student between freshman and senior years to determine appropriate progress toward graduation before the senior year. This evaluation will allow students time to make any necessary corrections before graduation.

GENERAL EDUCATION ASSESSMENT:

ART AND VISUAL COMMUNICATION AND

ART APPRECIATION:

Student learning outcome 1, 2. And 3 for both sections did not meet expected or acceptable target goals. The report suggests shifting the curriculum to meet this learning objective.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR GENERAL EDUCATION ASSESSEMENT:

Student learning outcome 1, 2, and 3 did not meet expected or acceptable target goals. The report suggests shifting the curriculum to meet this learning objective. The grades for General Education appear inflated and do not reflect the report of outcome goals. The general education courses establish an educational foundation and should not be overlooked. A short-term goal would to be asses these courses for rigor and academic integrity.

ASSESSMENT OF FACILITIES:

COMPUTER LAB:

The computer lab was updated in 2020 and replaced with MAC computers.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR COMPUTER LAB AND SPACES:

The MAC computers need to updated on a six-year rotation. It is integral to graphic design that the computer lab be maintained and updated. The adobe software should be routinely updated and the selection of MAC hardware should be powerful enough to run the adobe suite software. The machines need to run seamlessly with multiple programs interacting simultaneously.

It is critical that faculty office computers are updated with the same guidelines as the lab spaces. The faculty need the same relevant current tools and software that the students are using in the lab and for assignments. This will ensure that instructors have the ability to open, read, correct files as well as tutor students using their office equipment that mirrors the equipment and software in the lab.

WEB CITE RECOMMENDATIONS:

The department web page is integral to drawing students to the department. Often the initial interest in the department is sparked or extinguished by the department's web site. For graphic design program outcomes include a larger number of potential jobs. The current page suggests that students "joined business and organizations". This can be said of every degree. Be more specific with job titles and skill orientations that students will acquire as this will help build enthusiasm for the program. The art student program outcomes also need updated. The current description seems to encourage students to join graduate programs. Students without a desire for graduate education might inaccurately assume a graduate degree is the normal pathway or required pathway to success. Last the web site does not provide adequate information on the minors offered in the department.

Under the facilities tab, more photos of spaces may be persuasive to new students. Currently there are photos of buildings which help students find locations if they are new on campus but do not allow students to see studio spaces and equipment. A short-term recommendation would be to update this page with better photos that are a more visual tour may become a more successful recruiting tool. The heading on the page refers to Department of ACT. SWOSU uses the same acronym but we have found that ACT tends to confuse students and they are likely to related the name to the college test. For the web page I would recommend spelling out the department name for clarity.

ART STUDIO SPACES:

I was impressed with the current state of all the studio spaces in the Visual Arts building. First, the visual arts building is located on a main walkway and is highly visable to students traversing campus. There is a beautiful new sign out front of the building and the building boosts a large parking lot. The location hosts a lot of student foot traffic.

- A) The drawing studio classes are capped at 10-12 allowing for a low student to teacher ratio. The studio uses manikan and live models. There is beautiful new full spectrum lighting that has been recently installed and there are spots for shadowing.
- B) The graphic design lab is handsomely equipped with new MAC computers in 2020 as well as Waycom tablets. They are loaded with the adobe suite using the cloud.
- C) The printmaking studio is a very suitable space and this studio as well as others has been clearly marked for chemicals and safety indicators.
- D) The painting studio boosts individual painting spaces and is painting with reflective paint to help with lighting.
- E) The sculpture and ceramic studio is very organized. The vent hoods have been tested for filtration.
- F) The kiln room hosts a several kilns of differing sizes. Some kilns are just two years old.

G) Other spaces include a matt cutting area, a student lounge, lecture halls with large screens for zooming and lectures, clay storage area, area for spray painting, area for woodworking, and sculpture courtyard.

The department has clearly been diligent to upkeep the studio spaces. There is an inventory room with locking cabinets for art supplies. The inventory room has kept art supply costs down. Overall, I was impressed with the all the studio spaces, and the use of other spaces for students to work on projects. I noted several newer updates and I did not see any spaces that needed renovation or newer equipment. All the studio spaces housing equipment and supplies were very organized. Inventory is well kept and overall, the department seemed very well managed.

OVERALL PROGRAM QUALITY RATING: Satisfactory

Recommendations:

- Reduce the number of overloads: AGREE. It was suggested earlier to hire an art historian who can also help to reduce the faculty loads.
- 2) Need for an additional faculty member: AGREE. The department could benefit from an art historian whose courses would transcend across graphic design and art studio. This faculty member could help to alleviate any faculty overloads. The temporary full time faculty position should be converted to a tenure track full time position. The current employee is qualified and the department would benefit from retaining the employee.
- Additional evaluation of students: AGREE. It is recommended that students be evaluated between the freshman and senior years to evaluate progress and ensure that students are prepared for graduation.

- 4) Faculty member assigned to art education accreditation: AGREE. The art education program needs a program coordinator. It is a risk not to have a qualified individual to assess the process and to ensure the upcoming review.
- 5) Recruiting efforts needed: AGREE. The web site needs attention. The web site is the first place students are likely to go to find information about your programs. Boost your web site with photos of facilities, a video tour of the degrees and spaces, and clear information for incoming students.

SUMMARY:

Overall, the department is thriving. The faculty are well prepared and received by students and colleagues. The department may want to consider an additional faculty member who can teach both art history and studio courses. This would be a great position to bolster the current degree requirements and relieve faculty overload and course preparations. I was delighted to hear that the full-time temporary position has indeed been altered to be a permanent position.

I have made some suggestions for updating some of the degree sheets. The art education program would benefit from two additional courses. I suggest a foundational course in foundation of education and a course in child development.

The data on art program outcomes suggests the university is meeting most of the outcome goals. However, I would recommend completing a student assessment in the junior year. There is a freshman and senior assessment. The department would benefit from assessing progress in the junior year to determine progress toward graduation.

Recruitment and retention would greatly benefit from additional materials posted to the web site such as pictures of studio spaces and students working on art work. The department may want to consider of short promotional video as a recruitment tool showcasing the degree offerings and spaces available.

The studio spaces are in excellent condition. There are many updates including new kilns, mac computers, lighting, tablets, filtration, inventory cabinets, screens, and other updates. The studio and student spaces have been updated and I do not see any visible needs at the time of this report. These spaces have been beautifully maintained.

PROGRAM REVIEW ART – Response to External Reviewer Recommendations

- ART needs an Art Historian (p. 2). Reviewer states Art Historian/Studio Artist should be hired (p. 10). – AGREED. The faculty candidate must be able to teach both Art History and Color Theory and Painting courses. Will begin working toward completing this recommendation in Budget Year FY23-24.
- ART needs to convert the full-time temporary instructor to be replaced by a tenuretrack Assistant Professor position (p. 4). COMPLETED – The Instructor line was converted to a full-time tenure track line beginning August 2022.
- 3) ART needs to *consider* an advanced applied design option. WILL CONSIDER.
- 4) ART should include an Introduction to Graphic Design course in the requirements (p. 4-5). DISAGREE. Department previously offered an Introductory class with limited benefit and then decided to remove the course from curriculum.
- 5) ART *might consider* moving Typographic Design to the required course list of coursework (p. 5). WILL CONSIDER.
- 6) ART *might consider* Package Design as an elective (p. 5). WILL CONSIDER. Package Design assignments are completed in several graphic design classes.
- 7) ART should move Foundations of Education, and Child and Adolescent Development for Education Majors to the required list of courses. WILL CONSIDER. Faculty will discuss with Stewart Mayers to determine if this is something that needs to be accomplished.
- 8) ART should assign a faculty member to Art Education Accreditation. AGREED. However, the faculty and chair should determine whether a program coordinator (p. 10) is warranted given the relatively low enrollment in Art Education.
- 9) ART should develop a mid-level assessment to gauge student progress toward graduation (p. 5). AGREED. Faculty will begin working on this mid-level assessment instrument for implementation in AY 24-25.
- 10) ART should assess general education courses for rigor and academic integrity (p. 6). AGREE. Art will continue General Education assessment practices.
- 11) Visual Arts Mac Lab should be updated on a six-year rotation. Adobe software should be routinely updated (p. 6). AGREE. Faculty and Chair will work with IT to ensure computer labs continue to meet the department's instructional goals.

- 12) Faculty Office computers need to follow same guidelines as Visual Arts Mac Lab (p. 6). AGREE. Faculty and Chair will work with IT/Academic Affairs to ensure office computers and equipment meet faculty instructional/administrative needs.
- 13) University website content needs to be enhanced providing specific written content and photographs of students in studio spaces. AGREE. Faculty and Chair will offer suggestions to University Communications regarding development of university website.
- 14) Remove ACT (Art, Communication, and Theatre) language from website, as potential students confuse this name with the ACT test for college admission. AGREE. Faculty and Chair will offer suggestions to University Communications regarding development of university website.
