COURSE OVERVIEW In this course, we will attempt to learn and perform the following:

- install basic HPC OS from scratch
- repair/replace compute node hardware
- modify network settings on switches
- install packages on cluster
- add/modify users on cluster
- monitor cluster health
- troubleshoot problems
- perform routine maintenance/backup on cluster
- execute code written for HPC clusters
- manage job schedulers

It is hoped that by the end of this course, students will have the knowledge sufficient to make them candidates for HPC oriented positions at institutions with cluster hardware.

COURSE
OUTLINE/WORK The semester will start with an history of the HPC systems here at Southeastern, with an introduction to our current cluster and its hardware and topology. We will then deconstruct our cluster and build a new cluster from the ground up, making use of a new switch, new hardware, and new interconnects. By the end of the semester, each student should be able to build/rebuild our cluster from scratch and manage the resulting system.

We will work closely with counterparts from across the state in learning the standards employed at other institutions, learning the latest in cutting edge cluster management tools (such as Razor). Of equal importance is being able to execute existing code on the new cluster, so we will also learn about compiling, scheduling, and executing parallel programs on the new cluster.

This course will have a large hands-on component, and as such, attendance is mandatory. Expect to spend many class periods in the Visual Arts data closet, where our cluster is housed, working on building/altering our hardware. We will also work on our cluster remotely as well, which will be another aspect of cluster management.

GRADES Since this course is designed to be hands-on, a large percentage of your final grade is attendance. It is expected that students show up on time, ready to work, and willing to participate. Each student will be tasked, by the end of the semester, to rebuild the cluster from scratch, troubleshoot problems, and exhibit a mastery of processes we will have learned throughout the semester.

- 60% - Attendance: on time, participating, actively engaged.
- 40% - Final Demonstration: be able to build cluster from scratch, troubleshoot problems, apply knowledge learned.
