

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# Baby Got Bite

**The biting challenge:** All child care professionals have experienced biting in the classroom. This behavior can create anxiety for childcare professionals and parents alike. Although there is no "magic solution" to stop biting from occurring, there are many reasons for biting at different stages of development and strategies that child care professionals and parents can use to help prevent biting.

Why do children bite? According to Conscience Discipline, different stages of development mean different reasons for behaviors. <u>Babies</u> may bite simply to explore or to relieve teething pain. It may also just be an instinct they have due to the lack of self-control. <u>Toddlers</u> may bite because they are not getting enough gross motor activity; "biting or 'chomping' is a form of deep muscle stimulation." Children <u>beyond</u> their toddler stage may bite because they lack language skills. When a child cannot communicate their needs and emotions, this can cause frustration, which can lead to biting.

What should I do? For <u>babies</u>, provide items for them to bite; teething rings can be very beneficial when they are trying to relieve pain from teething. For <u>toddlers</u>, because biting often happens during free-time, creating more structure could improve biting. Dr. Barbara Sorrels suggests that providing things to climb on, using instruments, and doing more outdoor activities, can offer a much-needed distraction for biting. For <u>preschoolers</u>, activities such as listening to soft music, playing with play dough, practicing deep breathing, and yoga may relieve stress that causes biting. If a child is older than 4 and biting, this may be a sign that they have trouble expressing feelings or self-control and it may be a good idea to see a doctor.

What should I avoid doing? Avoid labeling the child as a "biter." This may affect the child's feelings towards themselves and in no way helps with the behavior. Avoid yelling or shaming the child, as well as giving too much attention to the child after they bite. While this is negative attention, it can still reinforce the behavior. While it may seem like the only option, avoid punishing children who bite. Punishment does not teach children the discipline or self-control that causes biting in most cases. Punishment can instead make a child defiant or embarrassed.



# **Mother Goose Recipes**


# Little Boy Blueberry Corn Salad

### For the Salad:

- 8 medium ears sweet corn
- 1 to 2 cups fresh blueberries
- 1/2 cup feta cheese

### **Directions:**

- 1. Pull off corn husks and remove silks.
- 2. Cut corn from cob.
- 3. Toast kernels in a dry skillet on medium heat until tender and a little charred, about 20 minutes. (**Tip**: Turn corn often, while some charring is nice, you don't want it to burn.)
- 4. Set corn aside to cool.
- 5. In a small bowl, whisk together oil, vinegar, chives, salt and pepper. Taste. Add lemon juice if too sweet or a pinch of sugar if too acidic.
- 6. Set out a large bowl and fill with cool, toasted corn.
- 7. Pour dressing on corn and stir.
- 8. Wash blueberries and pat dry, then stir them into the salad.
- 9. Crumble in the feta cheese and stir to incorporate.



- 3 Tablespoons Meyer lemon infused olive oil or extra virgin olive oil
- 3 Tablespoons white balsamic vinegar
- 1 handful fresh chives, cut into tiny pieces
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- Generous shake of ground pepper





# Muffin Man Zucchini Muffins

### Ingredients:

- 2 1/4 cups white whole wheat flour
- 3/4 cup dark brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1/4 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 1 tablespoon oil melted coconut oil, canola oil, or vegetable oil
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup grated apple
- 1/2 cup grated zucchini moisture slightly squeezed out
- 1 cup chopped peeled apple
- 2 tablespoons turbinado sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

### **Directions:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Line a muffin pan with paper liners or spray with cooking spray. Set aside.
- 2. In a large bowl, whisk together flour, brown sugar, baking soda, baking powder, salt, cinnamon, and allspice. In a small bowl, whisk together buttermilk, applesauce, oil, egg, and vanilla extract. Pour the wet ingredients over the dry ingredients and mix with a wooden spoon or spatula until just combined. Do not over mix. Gently stir in the grated apple, zucchini, and chopped apples.
- 3. To make the topping, combine turbinado sugar and cinnamon in a small bowl. Stir well.
- 4. Fill the prepared muffin pan with muffin batter, filling each cup about <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> the way full. Sprinkle each muffin with cinnamon sugar topping. Bake for 20 minutes, or until muffins are golden and a toothpick inserted in the center of a muffin comes out clean. Let muffins cool to room temperature and serve.

# Sing a Song of Spring

Songs you can sing or chant introduce children to vocabulary, build language comprehension, support math learning, promote self-regulation, and inspire creativity. Songs give children the opportunity to repeat and reinforce concepts in a playful and joyous way.

THE SPIDER SPINS A WEB

#### **Age Group:** Infants

#### What You Need: Your voice

What You Do: Lay the infant on her back in front of you and sing this song to the tune of The Farmer in the Dell. As you sing, hold your hands in front of you with your palms facing down, and place one wrist on top of the other. Wiggle your fingers like a spider. For the words "round and round" move in a circular motion, and for the words "up and down" move your arms up and down. End by tickling the baby's tummy. The spider spins a web. The spider spins a web; round and round and up and down, the spider spins a web.

What They Learn: Play that involves eye contact, touch, and singing strengthens the relationship between infant and caregiver. Infants are introduced to new vocabulary through movement. Point out spiders in children's books or when you discover them outdoors to extend learning.

### LITTLE CATERPILLAR



### Age Group: Toddlers

What You Need: Your voice What You Do: Sing to the tune of the Itsy-Bitsy Spider. Suggested gestures are in parentheses. The little caterpillar crawled upon a leaf (crawl the fingers of one hand on the open palm of the other); spun a little chrysalis (move your arms in a rolling motion in front of you), then he fell asleep (tilt your head to the side and rest it on your hands). While he was sleeping he dreamed that he could fly (move your arms as if flying), and when he woke up he was a beautiful butterfly (hold your hands in front of you with your palms facing out and interlock your thumbs. Keeping your fingers tight together, move them like wings).

What They Learn: This song is an introduction to the process of metamorphosis and introduces the scientific word "chrysalis." Children also cross the midline (an invisible line that divides our bodies in half) when they follow the gestures, which helps them build connections between the two hemispheres of the brain.

### FIVE BUSY BEES CHANT

#### Age Group: Preschool

What You Need: Chant the following rhyme using your fingers as indicated in parentheses. Five busy bees on a day so sunny (hold up all the fingers on one hand). Number one said, "I'd like to make some honey." (Bend down the first finger.) Number two said, "Tell me, where shall it be?" (Bend down the second finger.) Number three said, "In the old honey tree." (Bend down the third finger.) Number four said, "Let's gather pollen sweet." (Bend down the fourth finger.) Number five said, "Let's take it on our feet." (Bend down the thumb.)

What You Do: Children practice counting, hear new vocabulary, and learn about bees. Expand children's understanding of bees by going on a bee walk to observe bees outside (without disturbing them) and reading books about bees.

# BLACKBIRD OPPOSITES CHANT

### Age Group: School Age What You Need: Your voice

What You Do: This is a variation of the traditional Two Little Blackbirds chant. Use two fingers on each hand to be "blackbirds." Act out the following rhymes about opposites. The rhyming words are underlined and the opposite words are in bold. Two little blackbirds flying in the sky; one flies low while the other flies high. Two little blackbirds sitting on a cloud; one is quiet and the other is loud. Two little blackbirds sitting on a crown; one with a smile and one with a frown. Two little blackbirds in midflight; one goes left while the other goes right. Ask children to help you think of more rhyming words that have an opposite.

**What They Learn:** Children use critical thinking skills and acquired vocabulary knowledge to come up with words that rhyme and have an opposite word. Extend this activity by making a chart together of opposite words and rhyming words.






